To address the FEMA Core Capabilities, Operational Coordination and Operational Communications and the FEMA Mission Area Definitions, Prevention, Protection, and Response, the Fallon Police Department is requesting funding to allow our Special Response Unit and first responders to prevent, protect, and respond to acts of terror.

The Fallon Police Department has an established Special Response Unit (SRU) capable of responding immediately to an act of terror. The SRU team was formed in 2014 and comprises FPD Officers who fill the ranks of entry personnel, an overwatch element, and a negotiation element. The unit has worked closely in the past with members of the Churchill County Sheriff's Office (CHSO) and North Central Narcotics Task Force (NCNTF) on several operations. During past training events, we have collaborated with regional agencies to help prepare our responders for malicious acts or terrorist attacks, including an incident that may occur at Naval Air Station Fallon.

A diverse population perpetrates acts of terror, some for religious reasons, others as domestic terrorists, and some simply for criminal reasons. The diverse perpetrators drive home the fact that attacks can come at any time from anyone, and Fallon would not be immune to acts of terrorism; in fact, Fallon has targets of interest for both international and domestic terrorists.

International terrorists may consider Naval Air Station Fallon a "high-value" target. NAS Fallon is the home of the Naval Strike and Warfare Center, where SEAL Teams and "Top Gun" fighter pilot's train. The United States Armed Forces and the World consider it the premier pilot training facility. Those facts, combined with the fact that any military installation is a potential site of a terrorist attack, make Fallon a significant target. Additionally, the City of Fallon also has a military recruiting center within its jurisdiction.

There are many other susceptible terrorist targets within Fallon. Those include Fallon's municipal water supply, which supplies Naval Air Station Fallon with its drinking water, over one dozen schools within Fallon, and the many businesses where many citizens congregate.

Unfortunately, anywhere the public gathers can become a target, as several of the mass shootings and now vehicle assaults have occurred at both large and small gatherings across the United States. Further, the City of Fallon continues to have numerous annual events that continue to grow in popularity and attract others from nearby communities. The most notable is the annual Christmas Tree lighting where thousands of citizens

gather on our Maine Street. Although this continues to be a special event for our community, the security concern continues to be high due to its vulnerability.

The solution: Grant funding is required to adequately equip our Officers with training and equipment. The Fallon Police Department's annual budget is incapable of absorbing the additional expenses of some of the required equipment.

Obtain equipment to prepare Fallon Police Department Officers to combat acts of terrorism while prioritizing the preservation of life, infrastructure, and property. The Fallon Police Department will purchase the equipment after authorization is received, but before June 30, 2026. All items will be recorded into the Fallon Police Department inventory systems, and staff will be adequately trained to ensure proper utilization.

This equipment will allow enhancement of the first responder Operational Coordination. Specifically, the equipment assets will provide protection and preparedness for first responders to acts of terrorism and active assailants. Secondly, the equipment will offer protection to innocent civilians placed in harm's way. Lastly, it would provide the opportunity to proactively monitor large crowd events for potential threats from person(s) seeking to commit acts of terror.

- Plate carriers, ballistic plates, and pouches
 - O Plate carriers are universal in size and provide protection to the wearer over their vital areas against rifled caliber weapons. These plate carriers will be placed in Patrol vehicles for the responding Officer to deploy in the event of an active assailant. Modern ballistic protection and extra magazines/ammunition pouches will be part of the carrier for the Officer's use. This would equip and protect our first responding Officers to better combat acts of terrorism.
- Drone and drone accessories
 - o The Fallon Police Department Special Response Unit utilizes a variety of specialized equipment to accomplish public safety, minimize the impact on the surrounding citizens, ensure the safety of citizens and department members, and resolve critical incidents or acts of terror. The availability of a drone would allow for the deployment of the device in unknown or dangerous areas where the status of the threat is not currently known. It would allow for the visualization of the area with its attached camera without unnecessarily sending human assets in harm's way.
 - The use of a drone for security during significant crowd events is critical to identifying a potential threat before that threat commits an act of violence or terrorism by providing Officer(s) with real-time information.
 - o The Fallon Police Department has been in contact with other agencies that have established Drone programs for their law enforcement missions. Intentionally, we have selected a drone made by Anzu, an American company using American software. Our department is aware of Department of Defense restrictions and concerns when using foreign-made drones for government use.

 If awarded, the Fallon Police Department is aware of the FAA restrictions on a Law Enforcement drone pilot to pass a Part 107 drone license test.
 Only Officers who receive this license will be authorized to pilot the drone.

· Ballistic shields

O Commonly, the first law enforcement personnel on an active assailant scene or an act of terrorism will be the responding Patrol Officer. Therefore, it continues to become evident that the Patrol Officer needs to be equipped with the equipment needed to resolve the incident safely and quickly. Another option to protect hostages, innocent civilians, and law enforcement is ballistic shields to provide protection to those lives involved.

Special 40mm munitions

o The Fallon Police Department maintains 40mm launchers for use by both Patrol Officers and within our Special Response Unit. The preservation of life remains critical to the mission of law enforcement, and having numerous use-of-force options is a component of that. Special less lethal 40mm munitions are kept in inventory but do have an expiration date. Therefore, it remains necessary to maintain an upto-date inventory and replenish what has been used.

- 2) Report on expenditure of advance: Show the actual expenditure of the advanced funds. - 4) Quarterly report required: If there are no expenditures within the quarter, a report with an explanation of why and the plan for future expenditures is due by the end of the month following the end of the quarter. Due dates for quarterly reports are as follows:

October 31 - for reporting period July 1 to September 30;
- for reporting period October 1 to December 31;
- for reporting period January 1 to March 31; and
- for reporting period April 1 to June 30.

- Final report: There will be no further expenditures, the grant is closed, and no further reports are necessary. This report is due within 30 days after the end of the award period, or any time prior to the end of the award period if no further funds will be spent. Once the final report is processed there will no additional draws allowed for the sub-grant. If reporting is not in by the final date, the remaining funds will be de-obligated.
- C) EXERCISE REPORTS To be eligible for grant funding, the LEPC must report to the SERC by January 31st of each year on at least one real event and/or tabletop, functional, or full-scale exercise or drill which utilizes and implements the hazardous materials emergency response plan. An exercise is required at least once every year with every key element of the plan being implemented in the exercises within three years.
- D) GRANT CHANGE REQUEST Grant expenditures are authorized for the purposes set forth in this application, as approved in the grant award, and in accordance with all applicable laws, regulations, and policies and procedures of the State of Nevada and the applicable federal granting agency. Requests for change in the project must be submitted to the SERC and approved in writing prior to its implementation. Approval may be required by the Funding Committee if the change is significant, SERC Policy 8.7.
- E) The applicant must comply with the provisions for sub-awards stipulated at 2 CFR 200.311. The applicant assures the fiscal accountability of the funds received from the State Emergency Response Commission will be managed and accounted for by the lead agency's chief comptroller. Internal control and authority to ensure compliance with SERC's documentation, record keeping, accounting, and reporting guidelines will reside with that individual.
- F) SERC will reimburse the recipient reasonable, allowable, allocable cost of performance, in accordance with current federal requirements, Nevada Revised Statute, Nevada Administrative Code, State Administrative Manual, SERC policies and any other applicable fiscal rules, not to exceed the amount specified in the total award amount.
