#### I. GOALS:

Tell the SERC what you want to accomplish with this Allocation.

The goals are general statements of desired results and identify intended outcomes the program has established to achieve. Justification to support preparedness to combat terrorism must be addressed.

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The Nevada State Police is seeking support and logistical service for our police service dog (PSD) program specifically nourishment costs and boarding fees through the United We Stand grant. The Nevada State Police has a total of 10 Police Service Dogs throughout the state. The following is the distribution by division:

Nevada Highway Patrol – 6 Narcotics Detection Dogs Nevada Fire Marshall – 2 Accelerant Detection Dogs Capitol Police – 2 Explosive Detection Dogs

The Nevada State Police is committed to combating all acts of terrorism statewide. The United States Department of Justice (USDOJ) describes narcoterrorism as the involvement of terrorist organizations and insurgent groups in drug trafficking. One of the most effective tools the Nevada Highway Patrol deploys to combat narcoterrorism, are narcotic detection dogs (NDD's). These dogs play a pivotal role in combatting drug trafficking organizations (DTO's) which often have direct links to international terrorists' networks. The Nevada Highway Patrol's interdiction teams (north/south) serve as the state's first line of defense in combating narcoterrorism. In 2024 the Nevada Highway Patrol Narcotics Interdiction teams seized a total of 1,253 pounds of illicit narcotics from state highways.

In addition to NDD's, Nevada State Police, Fire Marshall division deployed 2 Accelerant Detection Dogs (ADD) effectively in 2025. The Nevada State Police, Fire Marshal Division is committed to combating "Pyroterrorism" Statewide. The United States Department of Justice (USDOJ) has defined pyroterrorism as the use of incendiary attacks to intimidate or coerce a government or civilian population. A historical analysis of terrorism indicates that terrorist strategies are incorporating the use of more simplistic destructive methods, like arson.

Explosive Detection Dogs (EDD) have also been deployed in northern and southern Nevada. Bomb threats occur every single day in the United States. No state is immune to the threat. In fact, 227 bomb threats were confirmed by the Brennan Center for Justice on election day in 2024, alone. Nevada State Police, Capitol Police Division is dedicated to the detection and prevention of domestic terrorism by use of explosive devices.

Goal #1: Funds allocated will be utilized to purchase appropriate dog food for all State Police Service Dogs statewide, including Narcotic Detection Dogs (NDDs), Explosive Detection Dogs (EDDs), and Accelerant Detection Dogs (ADDs). Proper nourishment that supports healthy weight management, dental health, and digestion will ensure that K9 handlers and their partners are available for deployment across the state at any time.

Goal #2: Support the overall well-being of the Nevada State Police Service Dog Program by securing funding for professional boarding at experienced kennels that provide a safe, comfortable, and supportive environment for service dogs during handler absences.

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Goal #1: Support the continuance of the Nevada State Police Service Dog Program by ensuring the comprehensive needs of all specialized K9 units are met through adequate resourcing. This includes securing appropriate sustenance that supports healthy weight management, dental health, and digestion, as well as the provision of highly trained narcotic detection dogs, explosive detection dogs and accelerant detection dogs.

Objective #1: Funds allocated will be utilized to purchase appropriate dog food for all State Police Service Dogs statewide, including Narcotic Detection Dogs (NDDs), Explosive Detection Dogs (EDDs), and Accelerant Detection Dogs (ADDs). Proper nourishment that supports healthy weight management, dental health, and digestion will ensure that K9 handlers and their partners are available for deployment across the state at any time.

Healthy NDDs possess a far superior sense of smell compared to humans, enabling them to detect narcotics concealed within vehicles. Similarly, EDDs are crucial for identifying explosive materials, mitigating threats to public safety, and ADDs play a vital role in arson investigations by detecting minute traces of accelerants.

Narcoterrorist groups continually develop clever concealment methods for narcotics in vehicles, and the evolving nature of threats necessitates the inclusion of explosive and incendiary detection capabilities. It is therefore imperative that all specialized K9s function at 100% of their capabilities during any deployment. Peak capabilities can only be achieved if K9 partners are afforded proper nutrition. Proper nutrition, including a balanced intake of fatty acids, is crucial for maintaining the health of the nasal epithelium, which houses the olfactory receptors essential for all detection work. Malnutrition can disrupt the fatty acid balance in these receptors, affecting their ability to detect low scent concentrations of narcotics, explosives, or accelerants. Upon approval, the funding for sustenance will be used in fiscal year 2026 until funds are exhausted.

Goal #2: Support the overall well-being of the Nevada State Police Service Dog Program by securing funding for professional boarding at experienced kennels that provide a safe, comfortable, and supportive environment for service dogs during handler absences.

Objective #2: Nevada's Service Dogs are highly trained and invaluable assets to the Nevada State Police. K9 handlers have a unique responsibility, as one of their primary tools and greatest assets is a living creature requiring constant care. Due to the demanding nature of law enforcement, K9 handlers may be required to take time off for various reasons, including scheduled annual leave, training assignments, temporary medical leave, or other unforeseen circumstances. During these times, it is crucial to have access to professional dog boarding facilities. Dog boarding provides temporary lodging where a K9 partner is cared for under the supervision of trained professionals. These professional caretakers ensure that meals and medication are administered properly, maintaining the consistent diet vital for a less stressful stay, ensuring comfort, and supporting their ongoing health and operational readiness. Proper kenneling facilities offer a secure and controlled environment, mitigating potential safety risks that might arise in less specialized settings. Staff at experienced kennels are equipped with the necessary dog management skills to handle each dog appropriately, understanding their specific needs and behaviors. Upon approval, the funding for boarding will be used in fiscal year 2026 until funds are exhausted.

The Nevada State Police Service Dogs deployed across the state of Nevada serve the following priorities:

- The Nevada Highway Patrol will continue to combat narcoterrorism and seize illicit narcotics being transported on Nevada highways. Once narcotic seizures are made, the information of the narcoterrorist(s)/smugglers who are transporting the illicit narcotics will be forwarded to federal partners for ongoing investigations that could potentially lead back to terrorist groups.
- —The Fire Marshall deploys their ADD's to further fire and pyroterrorism investigations within the state of Nevada. By supporting these assets, the State Police will be more effective in their fight against all forms of terrorism.
- Capitol Police will continue to prevent domestic terrorism and protect those effected by the use of explosive devices in the furtherance of terror.

If a privately owned vehicle is used for agency convenience, mileage may be reimbursed at the State rate, currently .655 cents per mile. If a personal vehicle is used for personal convenience, the reimbursement allowed is .3275 cents per mile. If an agency vehicle is used, reimbursement may be made for fuel charges based on receipt or agency fuel logs. Airport parking (most economical lot only) and ground transportation expenses are reimbursable upon presentation of receipts. Rental cars must be pre-approved by the SERC.

Dog boarding is a temporary lodging where a K9 partner is cared for under the supervision of trained professionals. These professional caretakers ensure that meals and medication are administered properly. Again, a consistent diet leads to a less stressful stay ensuring comfort and safety while the handler is away. Professional caretakers also ensure safety that may not be afforded to K9 partners in a different environment. Staff are equipped with dog management skills to handle each dog appropriately.
