

I. GOALS:

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Goal 1: Strengthen Hazardous Materials and CBRNE Response Capabilities to Protect Against Terrorism

Lincoln County encompasses just under 11,000 square miles of rural terrain, interstate transportation corridors (U.S. 93), critical infrastructure, and industrial facilities subject to EPCRA reporting. A transportation-based terrorist incident involving chemical agents, flammable gases, or hazardous materials would present immediate life safety and environmental risks across vast distances. This grant will enhance our ability to detect, contain, and mitigate chemical and hazardous materials threats through the acquisition of:

- NFPA 1991 Vapor-Tight Total Encapsulating Suits
- NFPA 1992 Certified Coveralls
- HazMat Boots and Respiratory Protection
- SCBA Cylinders and P100 Cartridges
- Thermal Imaging Cameras
- Piercing Applicators
- Vehicle Stabilization Systems

These assets directly support preparedness to combat terrorism by ensuring responders can safely identify and operate in environments involving chemical releases, explosive devices, clandestine lab materials, or toxic industrial chemicals used as weapons.

Intended Outcome: Increase responder survivability and expand operational capability to safely manage a terrorism-related hazardous materials event without delay.

Goal 2: Enhance Operational Coordination and Intelligence-Based Decision Making During Terrorism Incidents

During a terrorism event, rapid scene assessment, hazard identification, and coordinated response between fire, EMS, law enforcement, and state/federal partners is critical.

The requested thermal imaging cameras, vehicle stabilization systems, and respiratory equipment will:

- Provide real-time situational awareness
- Improve interagency operational coordination
- Support unified command operations
- Reduce secondary casualties
- Enhance scene safety during suspicious vehicle incidents or explosive events

Intended Outcome: Improve interoperability and decision-making capacity in the first operational period of a terrorism incident.

Goal 3: Improve Operational Communications and Public Safety Messaging Capacity During High-Risk Incidents

Respiratory protection, SCBA cylinders, and NFPA-certified chemical protective ensembles allow responders to safely operate in contaminated environments while maintaining communication systems and perimeter control.

These tools enable:

- Safe establishment of hot, warm, and cold zones
- Accurate hazard reporting
- Effective public warning and evacuation support
- Continuity of command communications

Intended Outcome: Ensure responders can safely gather and share information necessary to protect the public during a terrorism-related hazardous materials release.

Objective 2: Procure Thermal Imaging and Specialized Technical Rescue Equipment

WHAT will be purchased:

- 2 Yellow TXS Thermal Imager XS Dual Charger Bundles
- 2 AKRON Brass Piercing Applicators (3' and 6')
- 1 Grizzly Forcible Entry Bar
- 2 Supporter X2 Vehicle Stabilizers

WHO will complete the purchases:
The Lincoln County Emergency Manager, in coordination with the respective Fire District Chiefs and fiscal officers.
WHEN will purchases be made:
Immediately upon award and availability of funds (expected July 2026), with implementation completed during FY27 grant period.

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**1. Hazardous Materials PPE & Respiratory Protection
(Encapsulating Suits, Coveralls, SCBA Cylinders, Respirators, Cartridges)**

Mission Area: Prevention / Protection

Core Capability: Intelligence and Information Sharing
Proper chemical PPE enables responders to safely enter suspected terrorism environments (chemical release, clandestine lab, explosive precursor storage) and gather real-time hazard intelligence. Without certified NFPA vapor-tight protection, responders cannot safely assess, identify, or report hazardous threats.

These assets support intelligence gathering at the tactical level, enabling accurate reporting to State and Federal partners.

Mission Area: Protection

Core Capability: Cybersecurity
Modern terrorism threats may involve sabotage of critical infrastructure, including cyber-enabled attacks on industrial control systems that result in chemical releases. These protective ensembles allow safe mitigation of hazardous consequences of cyber-physical attacks.

Mission Area: ALL

Core Capability: Operational Coordination
NFPA-certified PPE standardizes response capability across Lincoln County's fire districts, improving interoperability and ensuring safe integration into unified command structures.

Mission Area: ALL

Core Capability: Public Information and Warning

Responders operating safely in contaminated zones can accurately determine evacuation needs, establish safe perimeters, and provide reliable information for public warning systems.

Mission Area: Response

Core Capability: Operational Communications

Respiratory protection and SCBA cylinders ensure responders can operate while maintaining communication systems in IDLH (Immediately Dangerous to Life and Health) environments, supporting sustained incident communications.

2. Thermal Imaging Cameras

Mission Area: Prevention / Protection

Core Capability: Intelligence and Information Sharing

Thermal imagers provide immediate detection of heat signatures, hidden fires, explosive device indicators, or concealed persons during terrorism incidents. This enhances situational awareness and threat identification.

Mission Area: ALL

Core Capability: Operational Coordination

Real-time visual data improves unified command decision-making and reduces uncertainty during high-risk incidents.

Mission Area: Response

Core Capability: Operational Communications

Thermal imaging enhances responder-to-command information flow, allowing clear hazard reporting and tactical adjustments.

3. Vehicle Stabilizers & Piercing Applicators

Mission Area: Prevention / Protection

Core Capability: Intelligence and Information Sharing

Suspicious vehicle incidents are common elements of terrorist activity. Stabilization equipment allows safe access to vehicles potentially containing explosives or hazardous materials.

A transportation-based terrorist incident involving hazardous materials, explosive devices, or toxic industrial chemicals would require immediate local response

prior to the arrival of state or federal assets. Due to geographic isolation, initial operational capability must exist at the local level.

The following equipment addresses identified capability gaps:

NFPA 1991 Vapor-Tight Total Encapsulating Suits (Zytron 500)

These fully encapsulating, NFPA-certified vapor-tight suits allow responders to safely enter environments contaminated by chemical agents, toxic industrial chemicals, or hazardous materials potentially used in a terrorism event.

Benefit to the Project:

- Enables safe entry into hot zones involving unknown chemical releases.
- Protects responders from vapor exposure during suspected CBRNE incidents.
- Allows safe reconnaissance and hazard identification necessary for intelligence and information sharing.

Why

Without vapor-tight protection, responders cannot safely gather situational intelligence or perform life-saving operations in contaminated environments. These suits are critical to achieving our goal of strengthening hazardous materials and terrorism response capability.

Necessary:

NFPA 1992 Chemical Protective Coveralls

These certified splash-protective garments provide secondary-level protection during decontamination operations, perimeter control, and support functions within warm zones.

Benefit to the Project:

- Expands the number of protected responders during a hazardous materials event.
- Supports operational coordination by allowing multiple agencies to function safely in controlled zones.
- Reduces risk of responder contamination and secondary exposure.

Why

In a terrorism-related chemical release, layered PPE options are essential to maintain sustained operations and protect personnel performing support roles.

Necessary:

HazMat Boots, Respirators, and P100 Cartridges

The requested respiratory protection and chemical-resistant footwear provide safe, scalable protection for responders during hazardous materials incidents.

Benefit to the Project:

- Enables air-purifying respiratory protection during extended operations.
- Allows safe evidence handling and scene stabilization.
- Supports perimeter security and operational continuity.

Why

Respiratory protection is fundamental to responder survivability during incidents involving airborne toxins or particulate threats, including those potentially introduced during terrorist activity.

Necessary:

45-Minute 4500 PSI SCBA Cylinders

These SCBA cylinders provide extended-duration air supply during IDLH (Immediately Dangerous to Life and Health) operations.

Benefit to the Project:

- **Increases operational time in contaminated environments.**
- **Supports rescue and reconnaissance during suspected chemical or explosive events.**
- **Enhances operational communications by allowing responders to safely remain in hot zones while maintaining command structure coordination.**

Why

Necessary:

Extended air capacity is critical in large-area rural incidents where relief crews may be delayed due to distance. These cylinders directly support responder survivability and sustained operations.

Thermal Imaging Cameras (TXS Thermal Imager Bundles)

Thermal imaging cameras enhance situational awareness during structure fires, vehicle incidents, suspicious package responses, and search operations.

Benefit to the Project:

- **Detects hidden heat sources, potential explosive device indicators, and concealed victims.**
- **Supports intelligence gathering during terrorism-related incidents.**
- **Improves decision-making within unified command structures.**

Why

Necessary:

In the early operational period of a terrorism event, rapid visual intelligence improves hazard identification and reduces risk to responders and civilians.

Vehicle Stabilization Systems (Supporter X2)

These stabilization systems allow responders to secure vehicles involved in crashes or suspicious vehicle incidents prior to entry.

Benefit to the Project:

- **Supports safe access during vehicle-borne IED concerns.**
- **Reduces risk of secondary injury during rescue operations.**
- **Enhances interagency coordination between fire and law enforcement.**

Why

Necessary:

Vehicle-borne threats are a recognized terrorism tactic. Stabilization equipment is essential for safe scene control and victim rescue.

Piercing Applicators (3' and 6')

These specialized firefighting tools allow for the application of water into enclosed compartments without full entry.

Benefit to the Project:

- **Allows suppression of fires in suspicious vehicles or containers without immediate entry.**
- **Reduces risk during potential explosive or hazardous material incidents.**
- **Supports controlled mitigation of threats.**

Why

Necessary:

Minimizing responder exposure during unknown or suspicious incidents is critical to terrorism preparedness.

Grizzly Forcible Entry Bar

This heavy-duty tool supports forced entry during rescue operations or access to secured structures.

Benefit to the Project:

- Enhances rapid access during high-risk incidents.
- Supports rescue and intelligence operations in barricaded or secured environments.

Why

Rapid access capability is essential during mass casualty or terrorist-related events where seconds matter.

Necessary:**Overall Project Impact**

Collectively, this equipment:

- Strengthens local-level terrorism response capability.
- Enhances operational coordination across multiple fire districts.
- Improves responder survivability.
- Supports intelligence gathering and information sharing.
- Increases the County's ability to safely manage CBRNE-type incidents.
- Reduces reliance on delayed external resources due to geographic isolation.

These assets are necessary to achieve the established goals of improving hazardous materials readiness, operational coordination, public safety protection, and response capability within Lincoln County.

- D) **GRANT CHANGE REQUEST** – Grant expenditures are authorized for the purposes set forth in this application, as approved in the grant award, and in accordance with all applicable laws, regulations, and policies and procedures of the State of Nevada and the applicable federal granting agency. Requests for change in the project must be submitted to the SERC and approved in writing prior to its implementation. Approval may be required by the Funding Committee if the change is significant, SERC Policy 8.7.
- E) The applicant must comply with the provisions for sub-awards stipulated at 2 *CFR* 200.311. The applicant assures the fiscal accountability of the funds received from the State Emergency Response Commission will be managed and accounted for by the lead agency's chief comptroller. 

Cherry reported that Steph Vincent would like to be on the schedule for training because she has a lot of new staff so her school could be used for an exercise. The past drills done in schools and in the communities were discussed. Derek said some of the state provided trainings were battery awareness to raise awareness on lithium batteries and 8 hour rail car response related to HAZMAT. The structure of the classes were discussed. Derek said he would work on organizing these classes.

Olivia Mitchell spoke of some conference training opportunities in June. She said they are still moving forward with the MCI trailer and the hospital was taking over the project.
