I. **GOALS:**

Justification to support preparedness to combat terrorism must be addressed.

Goal 1: Increase operational coordination and information sharing capabilities by strengthening law enforcement's ability to respond to terrorism incidents that require thermal and night vision equipment.

Justification: Terrorist incidents—particularly those involving active shooters, coordinated attacks, or critical infrastructure targeting—are increasingly conducted during hours of darkness to exploit reduced visibility and delayed response. Rural and semi-rural jurisdictions such as Lyon County face additional challenges due to limited ambient lighting, extended response times, and large geographic coverage areas. The acquisition of night-vision equipment will significantly enhance the ability of the Yerington Police Department and the Lyon County Sheriff's Office to detect, identify, and neutralize threats in low-light conditions. This capability directly supports terrorism response and mitigation by improving situational awareness, reducing officer vulnerability, and increasing the likelihood of rapid threat interdiction.

Goal 2: Increase operational coordination capability by strengthening law enforcement's ability to respond to terrorism incidents involving barricaded subjects, hostage situations, or fortified positions within structures.

Justification: Terrorist attacks frequently involve barricaded suspects, hostage situations, or fortified positions within structures such as schools, government buildings, and commercial occupancies. Effective response requires coordinated breaching tactics that minimize time to entry while maximizing safety for victims and responders. Currently, both agencies have limited access to realistic training environments that replicate structural resistance, door types, and entry challenges encountered in real incidents. The development of a breaching façade will provide a controlled, repeatable training environment for practicing forced-entry techniques under realistic conditions.

This capability supports terrorism mitigation and response by:

- Reducing time required to access victims during active threat incidents
- Increasing officer proficiency in high-risk entry operations
- Enhancing coordination between agencies during joint tactical responses

In addition, The acquisition of standardized breaching tools will enable both agencies to rapidly defeat barriers such as reinforced doors, locks, and barricades. These tools will be deployed in conjunction with training conducted on the breaching façade, ensuring personnel are both equipped and proficient.

1. By December 31, 2026, Lyon County Emergency Management (on behalf of LEPC) will outfit the Lyon County Sheriff's Office and Yerington Police Department with thermal and night vision equipment, training façade, and breaching tools requested.
2. By May 31, 2027, the Lyon County Sheriff's Office will conduct at least 1 drill utilizing the thermal and night vision equipment, training façade and breaching tools.

Intelligence and Information Sharing: Night vision enhances real-time intelligence gathering during active incidents, allowing officers to observe suspect movement, identify threats, and relay actionable information across agencies. Training scenarios can incorporate intelligence-driven variables (e.g., suspect location, threat type), reinforcing decision-making based on shared information. Further, Proper tools allow teams to act immediately on intelligence regarding suspect location or victim confinement, reducing delays between information receipt and action.

Operational Communications: Enhanced visibility supports clearer, more accurate communication between units, reducing misidentification risks and improving coordinated tactical operations. The façade allows teams to practice coordinated communication during dynamic entry scenarios, improving clarity and command presence under stress. Standardized equipment allows for predictable, coordinated actions during entry operations, improving communication efficiency.

Upon acceptance of funding from the State of Nevada Emergency Response Commission (SERC), the applicant and the lead governmental unit hereby agree to the following Certified Assurances governing the awarding of funds:

A) The applicant assures compliance with the Nevada Administrative Code (NAC) 459.9912 et seq. and SERC policies found at <http://serc.nv.gov>.

B) **FINANCIAL REPORTS** – The recipient is required to submit, at a minimum, quarterly financial reports to the SERC. Reporting must be made in accordance with all applicable federal, state, and local laws and regulations, and SERC Policies 8.5 and 8.6.

No expenditures or obligations will be eligible for reimbursement if occurring prior to or after the award period. All funds need to be obligated by the end of the grant period and expended by the final report date as stated in the grant award cover letter. Failure to submit proper reports pursuant to current policies may jeopardize future funding from the SERC and could result in a denial of reimbursement of funds expended. Failure to comply with this requirement can result in the delay or denial of future reimbursements.

1) **Request for advance:** May be requested only if expenses total over \$2,000.00 and is accompanied by a dated purchase order or quote. Complete and submit a financial report form with the appropriate "request for advance" box checked.

2) **Report on expenditure of advance:** Show the actual expenditure of the advanced funds. Complete and submit a financial report form with the appropriate "report on expenditure of advance" box checked. This report is due **within 30 days** of the date of the advanced check and must include copies of dated invoices and proof of payment. If the amount advanced is more than the amount spent or the advanced amount is not spent within the 30 days, the unexpended funds are to be returned to the SERC within 45 days* of the date of the check.

3) **Request for reimbursement:** Complete and submit a financial report form, at a minimum quarterly, for all expenditures funded by the grant. Include a summary breakdown of expenses, copies of dated invoices, proof of payment and any other documents required by SERC policies. Any other form of documentation for expenditure must be approved by the SERC staff. If additional non-federal funds or resources are used toward the project, report those expenditures as a **match** in the appropriate line on the report form.

4) **Quarterly report required:** If there are no expenditure within the quarter, a report with an explanation of why and the plan for future expenditures is due by the end of the month following the end of the quarter. Due dates for quarterly reports are as follows:

- October 30** - for reporting period July 1 to September 30.
- January 29** - for reporting period October 1 to December 31.
- April 30** - for reporting period January 1 to March 31; and
- July 9** - for reporting period April 1 to May 31.

5) **Final report:** There will be no further expenditures, the grant is closed, and no further reports are necessary. This report is due within 30 days after the end of the award period, or any time prior to the end of the award period if no further funds will be spent. Once the final report is processed there will no additional draws allowed for the sub-grant. If reporting is not in by the final date, the remaining funds will be de-obligated.

- C) **EXERCISE REPORTS** – To be eligible for grant funding, the LEPC must report to the SERC by January 31st of each year on at least one real event and/or tabletop, functional, or full-scale exercise or drill which utilizes and implements the hazardous materials emergency response plan. Exercise is required at least once every year with every key element of the plan being implemented in the exercises within three years.
- D) **GRANT CHANGE REQUEST** – Grant expenditures are authorized for the purposes set forth in this application, as approved in the grant award, and in accordance with all applicable laws, regulations, and policies and procedures of the State of Nevada and the applicable federal granting agency. Requests for change in the project must be submitted to the SERC and approved in writing prior to its implementation. Approval may be required by the Funding Committee if the change is significant, SERC Policy 8.7.
- E) The applicant must comply with the provisions for sub-awards stipulated at 2 *CFR* 200.311. The applicant assures the fiscal accountability of the funds received from the State Emergency Response Commission will be managed and accounted for by the lead agency's chief comptroller. Internal control and authority to ensure compliance with SERC's documentation, record keeping, accounting, and reporting guidelines will reside with that individual.
- F) SERC will **reimburse the recipient** reasonable, allowable, allocable cost of performance, in accordance with current federal requirements, Nevada Revised Statute, Nevada Administrative Code, State Administrative Manual, SERC policies and any other applicable fiscal rules, not to exceed the amount specified in the total award amount.
- G) The applicant assures it shall maintain data and information to provide accurate financial reports to SERC. Said reports shall be provided in form, by due dates and containing data and information as SERC reasonably requires to administer the program.
- H) The applicant will give the SERC, through any authorized representative, access to and the right to examine all records, books, papers, or documents related to the grant or grant requirements. The Uniform Guidance/OMB Guidance provides greater clarity to the role and expectations for pass-through entities conducting oversight of sub-recipients. The application may not exceed \$32,000. Do not round the unit prices or the line-item totals. Round up the grand total of each category to the nearest dollar.

Pursuant to NRS 459.735 (4), this grant is to provide financial assistance to state or local governments in this state to **support preparedness to combat terrorism** including, without limitation, planning, training, and purchasing of supplies and equipment. The application **must** relate to activities that support preparedness to combat terrorism, and requests must address one or more of the Nevada Commission on Homeland Security priorities (information attached and on the SERC website). Please include a prioritization of the items requested.

Applications requesting communication equipment are required to complete the Communication Interoperability Questionnaire.

SERC has developed this application kit as a template for Local Emergency Planning Committees (LEPCs) to apply for the UWS Planning, Training, Supplies and Equipment (UWS) Grant. Application and award of grants are managed pursuant to SERC policy 8.2a. The source of funding is derived from fees collected from the sale and annual renewal of United We Stand specialty license plates. As these are State funds, there is no Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA) number associated with this grant.

The grant project period is expected to be July 13, 2026, to May 31, 2027. Grant funds are distributed on a reimbursement basis; however, the LEPC may request advance funding for expenses over \$2,000, policy 8.5.

LEPCs are eligible for funding through this grant if they are in compliance with the Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act (EPCRA), Nevada Administrative Code (NAC) and SERC policies. SERC policies may be reviewed at <http://serc.nv.gov>.

The application must include justifications of use of funds to support preparedness to combat terrorism - NRS 202.4415 defines acts of terrorism.

Pursuant to SERC policy 8.2a, the grant application must address one or more of the Nevada Commission on Homeland Security priorities available at <http://serc.nv.gov>.

The format is as follows:

- I. **Goals** - Identify what the LEPC would like to accomplish with the requested grant funds to support preparedness to combat terrorism for the period July 2026 through May 2027.
- II. **Objectives** - Identify the specific approaches to achieve goals through preparedness to combat terrorism. Objectives need to be specific and measurable.
- III. **Homeland Security Priorities** – Justify how each requested item or category of items address at least one of the Nevada Commission on Homeland Security priorities. If the grant application request categories of items (i.e., PPE, Communications, etc.), it is not necessary to list each item individually in this section.
- IV. **Line-Item Budgets** – List each item as a line item on the budget page. **The grant request shall be for NO MORE THAN \$32,000.** Please include a prioritization of the items requested.
- V. **Budget Narrative** – Explain each item listed in the line-item budget. Remember to comply with SERC Policy 8.2a related to the required quotes or sole source for appropriate purchases. If you have questions, please contact the SERC office.

After completing the application, a PDF version e-mailed to the SERC is preferred with any additional pages included e.g., quotes, letter of denial, etc. or you may submit the entire application package with all attachments by mail.

If you submit it electronically and do not receive confirmation of receipt within 24 hours or two business days, please follow up with the SERC.

2. Public Participation

Taylor Allison asked for public comment and there was none.

3. For Possible Action: Review and adoption of agenda

Andrew Haskin made a motion to adopt the agenda as presented, Brad Pope seconded. Taylor Allison asked for public comment and there was none. The motion passed unanimously.

4. REGULAR AGENDA

4.a. For Possible Action: Approve the January 21, 2026 Minutes.

Gavin Henderson made a motion to approve the January 21, 2026 minutes, Lacey Parrot seconded.

Taylor Allison asked for public comment and there was none.

The motion passed unanimously.

4.b For Possible Action: Review and approve FY27 State of Nevada Emergency Response Commission (SERC) grant proposals, and approve the Lyon County Emergency Manager submit applications on behalf of the LEPC.

Taylor informed everyone that the SERC only gave a couple of weeks to submit the first grant. The meeting was quickly organized to be able to submit the first grant because the OPTE grant is due today. The UWS grant which is typically for LE and typically used for addressing terrorism type projects are due by April 25, 2026.

We will start with the UWS because the SO did submit approvals for thermal night vision goggles to wrap up we have purchased goggles for the last two year cycle along with training equipment for the Regional Training Facility, a shield and breaching equipment for patrol was received in advance. YPD was asked if they planned on requesting anything from funding this year. Chief Clanton responded that he did, but hadn't had time to submit. Taylor requested to have what is anticipated to be submitted and approved today and the grant paperwork before the deadline. The grant is only \$32,000. Chief Clanton reported that he would be requesting night vision goggles as well. Taylor said that since there are two proposals and \$32,000 asked if there was a willingness to split the \$32,000 to purchase between the two agencies. Chief Clanton stated that he didn't need as much as the LCSO and there was a willingness to split 25% for YPD and 75% for the LCSO for the UWS grant.

Taylor reported that for the FY27 OPTE grant typically goes to meeting the regional hazmat objectives for the FPD and other agencies that want to address hazmat risks. Taylor stated that previously we have submitted for decon equipment, PPE, confined space equipment. CLCFPD did submit a general concept proposal for confined space, but they are not present and unsure what equipment they are looking for. Lacy Parrott asked if CLCFPD has submitted for a total. Taylor stated that they did not because of the turnaround. Taylor opened it up to other agencies if they were looking to submit a proposal this year. Lacy stated that she was going to request a couple more of the confined space packs, but since they received the majority of the grant last year they would take a smaller portion of the grant this year. Taylor asked about how much they cost. Lacy stated that run about \$3,000 and that they are looking at about \$6,390 for two confined space packs, but that MVFPD would take whatever is available. Lacy asked what the total is for this grant. Taylor stated that this grant is \$36,000, but \$4,000 is for operating costs so only \$32,000 can go toward equipment. Taylor said that an option is to request the two packs and use the rest of the funds for CLCFPD which would be the reverse of what was done last year. Taylor asked the attendees in person and on Zoom if anyone had any proposals for the OPTE grant. No one had any other proposals for the OPTE grant.

Taylor stated that this information gave enough direction for the two grants and that the grant that is due today can be submitted. We can get the backup documents can be for the UWS which is due next month.

Brad Pope made a motion to approve as presented, Shawn Clanton seconded.

Taylor Allison asked for public comment and there was none.

The motion passed unanimously.
