Nye County LEPC, via administrative staff from the Nye County Department of Emergency Management and the Nye County Finance Department will be responsible for administering this grant. Nye County DEM staff will purchase (1) 40HP three phase outdoor warning siren and arrange for installation with the vendor or Nye County Facilities Management department; Two 4-Gas Monitors and Two Handheld Metal Detectors. In cooperation with the Finance Department-Grants Management Team, DEM Staff will submit all invoices, receipts and required financial and backup documentation to the SERC quarterly and within the grant award period. Purchase will be made as soon as possible after acceptance of the grant by Nye County Board of County Commissioners.

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This project will address the following UWS Priorities: Prevention/Protection mission area (Intelligence and Information Sharing) and the "All" mission area (Public Information and Warning) by providing a high-powered, all hazard notification tool that alerts citizens who may be outdoors to take immediate

shelter, evacuate an area or other self protection actions, depending on the circumstances. In the event of the loss of other means of communications (telephone, television, radio, etc), outdoor warning sirens can provide a critical last resort alerting mechanism during a terrorism incident or any other large scale incident that may occur.

The 4-Gas meters have the ability to detect explosive, toxic, and asphyxiant gases (LEL, O2, CO, H2S) to identify improvised threats, protect personnel, and secure scenes. These monitors act as first-line screening tools for suspicious odors, unknown chemical incidents, arson investigations, and clandestine laboratories.

The 2 handheld metal detectors will serve as a vital, visible, and proactive counter-terrorism and security deterrent. They are typically used for secondary, targeted screening to identify metallic threats, such as firearms or knives, that trigger primary walkthrough detectors by allowing officers to isolate the source of an alarm quickly and precisely.

If an agency vehicle is used, reimbursement may be made for fuel charges based on receipt or agency fuel logs. The requested 40HP, three phase outdoor warning siren will be the second step (1 funding request has been submitted via the FY27 SERC/OPE grant) in Nye County Emergency Management's efforts to boost the County's mass communications capability by expanding on existing emergency warning siren systems in Beatty and Belmont. We intend to start with the population center of Nye County, the Town of Pahrump. The current plan for Pahrump is to purchase in phases, a total of 3 outdoor emergency warning sirens. The warning siren being requested in this application will be placed at Fire Station 1, in the central part of town. We intend to seek funding to purchase 2 additional, smaller warning sirens for Pahrump and place 1 on the northern end of town and 1 on the southern end of town. Nye County Emergency Management will develop and implement a plan for scheduled periodic testing and define policy and procedures for actual utilization of the emergency warning siren. The plan will include community engagement and partnering with local stakeholders and media, Pahrump Valley Fire/Rescue, Nye County PIO and the Nye County Sheriff's Office to make public announcements about the nature of any incident requiring the activation of the emergency warning siren.

The 4-Gas monitors will be issued to Fire Departments in Nye County to enhance their ability to detect dangerous, invisible gases on any incident scene, including possible terrorist attack incidents. These 4-Gas monitors test for LEL, oxygen, carbon monoxide, hydrogen sulfide, sulfur dioxide and nitrogen dioxide to help ensure safety of responders and citizens.

The 2 handheld metal detectors will be issued to bailiffs to be used to screen anyone entering the courthouses for weapons to aid in preventing an attack from inside the building. Handheld metal detectors (wands) in courtrooms serve as a vital, visible, and proactive counter-terrorism and security deterrent. They are typically used for secondary, targeted screening to identify metallic threats, such as firearms or knives, that trigger primary walkthrough detectors.

Upon acceptance of funding from the State of Nevada Emergency Response Commission (SERC), the applicant and the lead governmental unit hereby agree to the following Certified Assurances governing the awarding of funds:

- A) The applicant assures compliance with the Nevada Administrative Code (NAC) 459.9912 et seq. and SERC policies found at <http://serc.nv.gov>.
- B) **FINANCIAL REPORTS** – The recipient is required to submit, at a minimum, quarterly financial reports to the SERC. Reporting must be made in accordance with all applicable federal, state, and local laws and regulations, and SERC Policies 8.5 and 8.6.

No expenditures or obligations will be eligible for reimbursement if occurring prior to or after the award period. All funds need to be obligated by the end of the grant period and expended by the final report date as stated in the grant award cover letter. Failure to submit proper reports pursuant to current policies may jeopardize future funding from the SERC and could result in a denial of reimbursement of funds expended. Failure to comply with this requirement can result in the delay or denial of future reimbursements.

- 1) **Request for advance:** May be requested only if expenses total over \$2,000.00 and is accompanied by a dated purchase order or quote. Complete and submit a financial report form with the appropriate "request for advance" box checked.
- 2) **Report on expenditure of advance:** Show the actual expenditure of the advanced funds. Complete and submit a financial report form with the appropriate "report on expenditure of advance" box checked. This report is due **within 30 days** of the date of the advanced check and must include copies of dated invoices and proof of payment. If the amount advanced is more than the amount spent or the advanced amount is not spent within the 30 days, the unexpended funds are to be returned to the SERC within 45 days* of the date of the check.
- 3) **Request for reimbursement:** Complete and submit a financial report form, at a minimum quarterly, for all expenditures funded by the grant. Include a summary breakdown of expenses, copies of dated invoices, proof of payment and any other documents required by SERC policies. Any other form of documentation for expenditure must be approved by the SERC staff. If additional non-federal funds or resources are used toward the project, report those expenditures as a match in the appropriate line on the report form.
- 4) **Quarterly report required:** If there are no expenditure within the quarter, a report with an explanation of why and the plan for future expenditures is due by the end of the month following the end of the quarter. Due dates for quarterly reports are as follows:

October 30 - for reporting period July 1 to September 30.
January 29 - for reporting period October 1 to December 31.
April 30 - for reporting period January 1 to March 31; and
July 9 - for reporting period April 1 to May 31.

- 5) **Final report:** There will be no further expenditures, the grant is closed, and no further reports are necessary. This report is due within 30 days after the end of the award period, or any time prior to the end of the award period if no further funds will be spent. Once the final report is processed there will no additional draws allowed for the sub-grant. If reporting is not in by the final date, the remaining funds will be de-obligated.
- C) **EXERCISE REPORTS** – To be eligible for grant funding, the LEPC must report to the SERC by January 31st of each year on at least one real event and/or tabletop, functional, or full-scale exercise or drill which utilizes and implements the hazardous materials emergency response plan. Exercise is required at least once every year with every key element of the plan being implemented in the exercises within three years.
- D) **GRANT CHANGE REQUEST** – Grant expenditures are authorized for the purposes set forth in this application, as approved in the grant award, and in accordance with all applicable laws, regulations, and policies and procedures of the State of Nevada and the applicable federal granting agency. Requests for change in the project must be submitted to the SERC and approved in writing prior to its implementation. Approval may be required by the Funding Committee if the change is significant, SERC Policy 8.7.
- E) The applicant must comply with the provisions for sub-awards stipulated at 2 *CFR* 200.311. The applicant assures the fiscal accountability of the funds received from the State Emergency Response Commission will be managed and accounted for by the lead agency's chief comptroller. Internal control and authority to ensure compliance with SERC's documentation, record keeping, accounting, and reporting guidelines will reside with that individual.
- F) SERC will reimburse the recipient reasonable, allowable, allocable cost of performance, in accordance with current federal requirements, Nevada Revised Statute, Nevada Administrative Code, State Administrative Manual, SERC policies and any other applicable fiscal rules, not to exceed the amount specified in the total award amount.
- G) The applicant assures it shall maintain data and information to provide accurate financial reports to SERC. Said reports shall be provided in form, by due dates and containing data and information as SERC reasonably requires to administer the program.
- H) The applicant will give the SERC, through any authorized representative, access to and the right to examine all records, books, papers, or documents related to the grant or grant requirements. The Uniform Guidance/OMB Guidance provides greater clarity to the role and expectations for pass-through entities conducting oversight of sub-recipients. 1. **CALL TO ORDER & ROLL CALL (NON ACTION ITEM)**: The meeting was called to order at 9:30 a.m. Roll was taken, a quorum is present.
2. **PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE (NON ACTION ITEM)**: Patrick Lazenby led the LEPC in the pledge of allegiance.
3. **PUBLIC COMMENT (NON ACTION ITEM)**: There was no public comment.
4. **FOR POSSIBLE ACTION-APPROVAL OF MINUTES**: Steve Bird made a motion to approve the minutes of the August 7th, 2025 LEPC meeting as written. Seconded by Lisa Blandi. None opposed, the motion passes.
5. **CHAIRMAN'S REPORT (NON ACTION ITEM)**
 - LLW Stakeholders Forum: Last meeting: 8/13/25; Next meeting: TBA
 - NSSAB Last meeting 9/10/25; Next meeting: TBA
 - Nye County & PVFRS quarterly reports, 3RD quarter 2025: Chair Lewis reviewed the run reports for PVFR & Nye County VFD's for Q3 2025.
 - Nye County & PVFRS responses, 3RD quarter 2025: Chair Lewis reviewed select PVFR & Nye County VFD responses for Q3 2025.
6. **COMMUNITY HEALTH NURSE UPDATE (NON ACTION ITEM)**: Genie Walker provided an update on Community Health Activities on behalf of Crystal Kennedy, CHN. Genie announced that the CHN's office participated in the Pahrump RAM event on October 4th & 5th and that the event was once again very successful. They have completed several vaccination POD's in Amargosa, Beatty, Goldfield, Pahrump and Tonopah. The CHN's office will also be participating in the Rural Nevada Community Health Fair in Dyer, NV on November 8th. She also announced that the Pahrump CHN's office can not get the High Dose flu vaccine which is recommended for ages 65+.
7. **NV OEM UPDATE (NON ACTION ITEM)**: Kimberly Palma-Ortega from the State of Nevada Office of Emergency Management gave an update to the committee on NV OEM activities. Kimberly stated that NV OEM has completed the Regional Integrated Preparedness Symposium (RIPS) with all regions in the state and is in the process of analyzing and publishing the outcomes and THIRA/SPR. NV OEM is reviewing their monthly All Jurisdiction EM Conference Calls process and procedures to limit redundant meetings and consolidating the All EM email distribution lists into one master list to try to limit the number of repetitive emails sent from various OEM sections. NV OEM has renewed the state's Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Southern Nevada Red Cross to provide mass care assistance in the event of disasters.
8. **FOR POSSIBLE ACTION-SUBCOMMITTEE UPDATES**: Subcommittee members have an opportunity to provide the LEPC with any updates and vote on action items.
 - ❖ Executive Subcommittee (Scott Lewis): No report
 - ❖ Planning & Training Subcommittee (Scott Lewis): DEM, PVFR and NCSO recently completed a 7 hour active assailant table top exercise (TTX) with NCSD. This TTX was part of the preparation for a full scale exercise with NCSD, possibly in December 2025. DEM, PVFR and NCSO will be participating in a TTX leading up to a full scale exercise

with the Nevada Southern Detention Center and a full scale exercise with Pahrump Health & Rehab later this year.

- ❖ **ACTION ITEM** Grants & Finance Subcommittee (Patrick Lazenby): The Committee will discuss whether to either allow or to not allow Nye County DEM to apply for, on behalf of the LEPC, any grants administered by the State Emergency Response Commission (SERC) that open for application between November 6th, 2025 and December 31st, 2026. These grants include but may not be limited to: the SERC-UWS (United We Stand) grant and the SERC-OPTE (Operational, Planning, Training and Equipment) grant. Steve Bird made a motion to allow Nye County DEM to apply for SERC grants as requested. Motion was seconded by John Koenig. None opposed, the motion passes.
 - ❖ **ACTION ITEM** Hazmat Plan Review Subcommittee (Mike Harmon): Annual review and approval of the LEPC HazMat Emergency Response Plan with the Committee. The LEPC will vote to approve the plan as written, approve the plan with corrections/exceptions or not approve the plan. Mike Harmon stated that there are no operational changes to the HazMat Plan but did recommend that the company name "U.S. Ecology" be changed to "Republic Services-Beatty Facility" within the document. Patrick will make recommended changes. Steve Bird made a motion to approve the HazMat ERP with the recommended correction. The motion was seconded by Steve Rosenbaum. None opposed, the motion passes.
 - ❖ **ACTION ITEM** Bylaws Review Subcommittee (Mike Harmon): Annual review and approval of the Nye County LEPC Bylaws. The LEPC will vote to approve the bylaws as written, approve the bylaws pending corrections/exceptions or not approve the bylaws. Mike Harmon stated that there are no changes to the LEPC Bylaws. Steve Bird made a motion to approve the LEPC Bylaws as written. Motion was seconded by Steve Rosenbaum. None opposed, the motion passes.
 - ❖ **Membership Review Subcommittee** (Frank Bonesteel): No report

10. **FOR POSSIBLE ACTION-NOMINATION OF NEW BYLAWS REVIEW SUBCOMMITTEE CHAIR:** The LEPC will nominate and vote to approve or disapprove the appointment of a new Bylaws Review Sub-Committee Chair. There is no term limit on this appointment. Mike Harmon nominated Patrick Lazenby to serve as the Bylaws subcommittee chair. Steve Bird and Jack Sypolt made a motion to second the nomination. None opposed, the motion passes.
11. **GRANT UPDATES (NON ACTION ITEM):** Patrick Lazenby updated the LEPC on current SERC grant projects.

-FY26 SERC/OPTE: Awarded \$22,192 to send up to 15 Nye County responders to FireShows West 2025 (only 5 attended, will request to re-direct balance into the Equipment category to help cover F500 EA); and \$9,808 for one 330 gal tote of F500 EA.
-FY26 SERC/UWS: Awarded \$31,381; \$29,881 for a UAV System for NCSO,

(PO #10-0035920) issued on 11/03/25 for UAV system; and \$1,500 for a thermal imaging spotting scope.

12. FOR POSSIBLE ACTION-SCHEDULING OF LEPC MEETINGS FOR 2026: The LEPC will discuss and vote to approve dates, times and locations for quarterly LEPC meetings for CY 2026. The committee discussed the following suggested dates and times for CY 2026 LEPC meetings. All meetings will be conducted at DEM Pahrump, virtually via MS-Teams and telephone call in:

PUBLIC COMMENT (2nd) (NON ACTION ITEM): Frank Bonesteel announced that although the NSSAB meeting for October 2025 was cancelled due to the government shutdown, the 2026 meetings are still on the calendar for February 18th, June 17th and September 16th. Dan Berc from NWS discussed the storm system that came through on 9/05/25 & 9/06/25, saying that this was a pretty strong storm that did cause some localized flooding. It is estimated that Pahrump received approximately ½ - ¾ inches of rain in just a few hours. Jack Sypolt discussed the incidents at the Amargosa Dune over the Halloween weekend. There were 2 serious incidents, one requiring Mercy Air airlift to a Las Vegas Hospital.

14. ADJOURNMENT (DISCUSSION/FOR POSSIBLE ACTION): Chair Lewis called for a motion to adjourn the meeting. A motion was made by Steve Bird. The motion was seconded by John Koenig. None opposed, the motion passes. The meeting was adjourned at 10:42 am.
